Sally Haslanger is a professor in the Department of Linguistics and Philosophy. She has published on topics in metaphysics, epistemology and feminist theory, with a recent emphasis on accounts of the social construction of race and gender. In metaphysics, her work has focused on theories of substance, especially on the problem of persistence through change and on Aristotle's view that substances are composites of matter and form. Her work in feminist theory takes up issues in feminist epistemology and metaphysics, with a special interest in the distinction between natural and social kinds. She has co-edited *Adoption Matters: Philosophical and Feminist Essays* (Cornell University Press, 2005) with Charlotte Witt, *Theorizing Feminisms* (Oxford University Press, 2005) with Elizabeth Hackett, and *Persistence* (MIT Press, 2006) with Roxanne Marie Kurtz.
