AMERICAN POLITICS IN THE 1990S

The American political scenario has undergone important changes since the beginning of the 1990s. The most outstanding of such changes is the return of the

Enlightenment and Great Awakening were two movements of thought that were of far reaching significance during the American revolutionary period in the 18th century.
