Contact Us Extraversion, conscientious and openness had a significant negative correlation with life satisfaction, and agreement has significant positive correlation with life satisfaction. The results of stepwise regression showed that personality traits can explain 19 percent of the variance in life satisfaction, interaction of Downloads: 84,953 income and education has not significant effect on the life satisfaction. The results of one way ANOVA indicated that there isn't significant difference between employed women life satisfaction and personality Visits: 282,768 trait in diversity higher education centers.
