Remittances, Migrants' Education and Immigration Policy: Theory and Evidence from Bilateral Data by Frédéric Docquier, Hillel Rapoport, Sara Salomone (November 2011)

## Abstract:

We investigate the relationship between remittances and migrants' education both theoretically and empirically, using origin bilateral remittance data. At a theoretical level we lay out a model of remittances interacting migrants' human capital with the dimensions of immigration policy: restrictiveness, and selectivity. The model predicts that the relationship between remittance and migrants' education is ambiguous and depends on the immigration policy conducted at destination. The effect of education is more likely to be positive when the immigration policy is more restrictive and less skill-selective. These predictions are the tested empirically using bilateral remittance and migration data and proxy measures for the restrictiveness and selectivity of immigration policies at destination. The results strongly support the theoretical analysis, suggesting that immigration policies are determined the sign and magnitude of the relationship between remittances and migrants' education.
