The National Arts Centre has named the first group of David Leighton Arts Fellows to be honoured through its Leighton Talent Development Endowment, recently established as a legacy and tribute to former NAC Board Chair, Dr. David Leighton. In keeping with the intent of the endowment, which is to support and develop emerging talent in the performing arts world, this year's Leighton Fellows are actors Renellla Beaucage and Paula Jean Foster.

Renellla Beaucage, both recent graduates from the University of Alberta Department of Drama programme, and Richard Wilson of Galiano Island, BC, representing a technical drama with urban ink Productions (Vancouver). (Please see attached biographies and photos.) Each of these three young Aboriginal artists is benefiting tremendously from the opportunity to work with the senior Aboriginal artists, creative team and NAC Artistic Director Peter Hinssen on Copper Thundershield, an NAC English Theatre urban ink Productions' coproduction. In addition, the honour and recognition associated with being named a Leighton Fellow is something they will each carry with them throughout their careers.

Copper Thundershield is an imaginative interpretation of the life of Canadian painter Norval Morrisseau. It is the final play in the 2006-07 English Theatre season. Peter Hinssen's inaugural season as Artistic Director.

While the play uses 1970 as its point of departure, it is a creative interpretation by the playwright Maude Clemens of Norval Morrisseau's possible meetings about his past life. It is not a biography or in any way a complete story of the many complex aspects of the artist's thoughts and history. Rather it is a way of looking at what Morrisseau's work means to us as a country. The Leighton Talent Development Endowment was established in honour of Dr. Leighton's service to the NAC. It is the third endowment created by the NAC Board of Trustees since 2002. The first two were established in honour of Dr. Leighton's term as Chair of the NAC Board of Trustees, during which time he helped lead the NAC into a time of unprecedented vitality and financial health. Dr. Leighton and his wife and partner Peggy Leighton were champions of the NAC, personally supporting each of the NAC's four artistic disciplines, and countless performances. Under the leadership of Ralph Barford, 10 founding partners each committed \$50,000 to the Leighton Talent Development Endowment. Its endowed gift of \$500,000 will be used to establish the David Leighton Arts Fellowship for emerging artists and arts professionals.

The other nine founding partners are: Grant and Alice Botter, Patsy Crawford, Margaret and Jim Fleck, The George and Helen Gardner Foundation, Donald K. Johnson, F. Ross Johnson, Michael and Sonja Koerner, John and Natty McArthur, Barbara Poole and the late John Poole.

David S.R. Leighton served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the NAC from May 1999 to June 2006.
