Research Interests

My work falls at the intersection of theoretical linguistics and the study of the English language, both diachronic and synchronic. I have worked on lexical semantics, predication, and verb argument structure, as well as noun phrase structure, nominal predication, and relative clauses. I have looked at the synchronic analysis of present-day English; historical data from Old English to early Modern English; and Hong Kong English. I have been concerned to present my findings within a robust and well theorised formal framework, and to see how a declarative monostratal theory of grammar needs to be adapted to encompass facts of language change and variation. My main theoretical commitments are to cognitive and functionalist frameworks. I am also concerned with how an understanding of the structures of other languages informs our understanding of English.
