Eric J. Goldberg received his Ph.D. from the University of Virginia in 1998 and his B.A. from the University of Pennsylvania in 1991. He specializes in the history of Late Antiquity and the Early Middle Ages, and his research focuses on the politics and culture of the Merovingian, Carolingian, and Anglo-Saxon worlds. His first book, Struggle for Empire: Kingship and Conflict under Louis the German, 817-876, offers the first study in English of the reign of Charlemagne's grandson, Louis the German (840-876). He is currently finishing a second book titled With Practice, Skill, and Cunning: Hunting in Frankish Europe, 500-1000. Related to this project, he recently published "Louis the Pious and the Hunt" in the journal Speculum. His research interests also include medieval environmental history, manuscripts and paleography, the history of the Church and Papacy, and the Vikings. Professor Goldberg has been awarded fellowships from the Alexander von Humboldt Stiftung, the National Endowment for the Humanities, the American Counsel for Learned
