"I believe that they deal with temperatures and [their] tolerance is better, along with the fact their components are higher. They are heartier and stronger, at least ours seem to be, versus our Holsteins. The Holsteins tend to drop after a few months at peak. Swiss hold their peak longer and steadier," she said.

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
